The Area News Coleambally woman looking to hand rural aged- care providers a lifeline

An innovative approach to keep the doors open at independent aged care facilities is being

championed by an MIA woman.

She says independent facilities, in particular, are struggling under the burden of regulations that have hit the sector in the wake of the Aged Care Royal Commission. Ms Hodgson hopes the project will save her outlet and others in a 200-kilometre radius, from Borowa to Hillston to Hay.

"My hope is this will keep us viable," she said.

"All nine facilities are in small communities with between 70 and 100 per cent occupancy along with waiting lists."

The cooperative is being assisted by a \$7 million Federal Government program called Care Together.

The program is administered by the Business Council of Cooperatives and

Mutuals and is trying to help establish co-ops in the care sector where traditional

business models are failing.

Difficulties attracting and retaining skilled workers, lack of resources to tackle increasing regulatory requirements and further expected legislative changes are just some of the burdens driving the move.

"Because we're independent, we're having to address all these issues ourselves," she said. "When it comes to aged care, there's a lot of reporting and standards that fall on staff. "The red tape is taking away our time and effort to invest in our residents and we're already facing staffing issues."

The cooperative will perform the back office and compliance functions for all nine operators. Assisting with recruitment will also be a part of its function. "Human resources is a huge problem," she said.

"Meeting requirements are difficult because we have to employ and there just aren't enough registered nurses out there to begin with.

"In order for me to recruit, I have to do so from overseas, which means having to pay for the

services of a recruitment company, accommodation, Visa costs, and hiring an immigration

lawyer." It's hoped the co-op will be operational by the end of the financial year.


"We're hoping to lodge the co-op rules by the end of March," Ms Hodgson said.






"Fortunately, we have funding from the Department of Health and Aged Care to assist us. "I really hope this works because if successful, we can provide this to other facilities as well."
